UGA-Liverpool Summer Study Abroad

Program Director and Course Leaders

Professor Jody Clay Warner, Department of Sociology Professor Susan Haire, Department of Political Science and Criminal Justice Studies

Academic Program

This study abroad program, based in Northwest England (Liverpool), offers coursework in political science and sociology with a focus on criminal justice. Students do not need to be criminal justice majors; if you are a criminal justice major, these will count in the degree program (under the category of major electives):

Crime in the Global Context (SOCI 4590). Taught by University of Georgia Sociology department head (who is also a Meigs teaching award winner), Dr. Jody Clay-Warner. In this course we will survey many of the major issues in criminology, including the nature of crime, causes of crime, and societal reactions to crime. In taking a global perspective, we will not only examine variation in crime incidence across cultures, but we will also consider differences in the meaning of crime across different cultures and societal contexts. Throughout the course, you will be encouraged to think critically and to weigh the evidence for and against various perspectives. In this way, the ultimate goal of the course is to provide you with the necessary tools to understand the complex issue of crime, as well as to evaluate crime-control strategies

Criminal Justice Systems in the US and UK (POLS 4781). Taught by University of Georgia political science professor and director of criminal justice studies, Dr. Susan Haire. This course will use a comparative approach, drawing on the U.S. experience, to develop students' understanding of the British criminal justice system. During the pre-trip preparation, students will engage in assignments that provide an overview of the British and US Court systems and how they compare in terms of criminal justice administration. After arriving in Liverpool, assignments will center on the legal profession, policing and trial courts in England and Wales (including excursions). The final portion of the course will compare appeals in the criminal justice system in the US and England and explore issues surrounding the International Criminal Court.
